Mark your calendar for the 4th Annual Financial Education in Oklahoma conference, to be held

Oct. 24 at the Moore Norman Technology Center, South Penn Campus in Oklahoma City.

The conference, sponsored by the Federal Reserve Bank of

Kansas City, Oklahoma City Branch in conjunction with the Oklahoma Jump\$tart Coalition, will bring together financial education service providers to learn about programs, share experiences and identify new strategies and resources to support common efforts.

This year's theme, **From Policy to Action**, will explore state policy initiatives and financial edu-

cation programs as well as their implications for the financial education field. A panel will discuss implementation of the new financial literacy component now required in Oklahoma schools.

Oklahoma Shows Significant Drop in Student Loan Cohort Default Rate

The Oklahoma Guaranteed Student Loan Program (OGSLP), Oklahoma's primary guarantor of Federal Family Education Loan (FFEL) Program student loans, reports that the state's student loan cohort default rate - the U.S. Department of Education's (USDE) primary indicator of borrower success in the repayment of student loans - has dropped significantly.

According to figures recently released by the USDE, Oklahoma's cohort default rate fell to 5.8 percent in 2005 from 6.5 percent the previous year. In other words, over 94 percent of student loan borrowers in Oklahoma are repaying their federal loans, which are secured with no collateral or demonstrated credit history.

OGSLP officials attribute the reduction in loan defaults to a wide spectrum of outreach and educational programs, which reflect the FFEL Program community's commitment to default prevention and financial literacy.

Tips of the Trade

Make the Most of Your College Cash

Heading off to (or back to) college and pondering how to pay for your education? Follow these tips to get the most bang for your financial aid buck.

Always go for free money first. To pay for school, take advantage of all grants, scholarships and college savings available to you before taking out a student loan.

Maximize your federal loan options. If you must borrow to pay for school, exhaust all federal loan options before considering "private" or "alternative" loans, which can have higher interest rates and fewer flexible repayment options.

Borrow only what you need. Before accepting any student loan, figure out how much money you'll actually need to cover your school expenses (your financial aid officer can help). Many students are offered more loan funds from outside sources than they actually need. Since loans must be repaid, it's best to borrow only what you need to pay for school.

Reevaluate often. At the end of each semester, take time for reflection. Did you find yourself with excess loan funds or were you struggling to get by? Monitor your needs and adjust your borrowing for next semester accordingly. Decide each time to borrow only what you need for school. Remember to always look for scholarships and grants before taking out student loans; something new may be available.
