OKMM AmeriCorps Members Attend Ceremony at State Capitol

Members of OKMM's AmeriCorps Education Award Program (OKMM-EAP) attended the annual AmeriCorps Swearing-In Ceremony on November 17 at the State Capitol. Nancy Sharrock, Executive Director of the Oklahoma Community Service Commission, spoke about the importance of AmeriCorps programs in our state and across the nation. Sharrock noted that AmeriCorps programs play



an integral role in meeting economic and community needs in America; in Oklahoma alone, there are currently more than 250 AmeriCorps members serving through 13 state-wide programs.

During the ceremony, AmeriCorps members were addressed and sworn-in by The Honorable Susan Savage, Oklahoma's Secretary of State. OKMM-EAP members and Site Supervisors from Western Oklahoma State College, the University of Oklahoma, and Oklahoma State University attended the event.

OKMM Member Training Series

Members from across Oklahoma gathered in Stillwater on November 19 for the first event of the OKMM-EAP Member Training Series. Guest speakers included David Russell of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City – Oklahoma City Branch, who discussed credit card debt in America, and Chad Lee, an OKMM-EAP member at Rose State College, who used interactive lessons to teach effective public speaking.

As a call to action to support National Family Volunteer Day, the OKMM-EAP team provided a personal finance and resource sharing workshop for residents at Mission of HOPE, a homeless shelter in Stillwater, after the training session. Participating OKMM-EAP sites included Oklahoma State University, Absentee Shawnee Tribe of Oklahoma, Rose State College, and Southeastern Oklahoma State University.

Avoid a Winter Debt Hangover

According to the Retail Express Index, American households spend an average of \$2,564 during the holidays, nearly half of which is spent on gifts. The Center for a New American Dream (CNAD) is dedicated to changing Americans' consumption patterns. "We're bombarded with commercial messages telling us that to have a meaningful holiday, we need to be nonstop shoppers," says Betsy Taylor, president of CNAD.

Have you considered the hidden costs of excessive holiday spending? We hope to emerge from the holidays refreshed and reconnected to people we care about; instead, we're usually exhausted and overextended. According to the American Bankers Association, it takes shoppers an average of four months to pay off holiday bills.

You can avoid overspending during the holiday season – and the inevitable regret that follows – by taking a few simple steps:

- choose a **"cash-only" policy**; shoppers tend to spend more when they pay with credit cards, and less when they use cash.
- evaluate (and edit) your gift list carefully. Decide what you're willing and able to spend, and build a gift budget within that framework.
- **get creative.** Give something homemade or offer your help with a special project. Draw names or chip-in for group gifts to reduce costs.
- remember that a greeting card or phone call can be as meaningful as a gift. Connecting with others is what the holidays are really about!

Recruit, Recruit, Recruit

Need recruiting ideas for the upcoming grant year? Try some of these networking options:

Community Leadership

- visit officials with set communication channels, like the mayor, city council members, and county commissioners.
- talk to homeowners associations, social clubs, and community service groups.

Faith-based Outreach

- offer an AmeriCorps information session after services, or as part of regular family ministry activities.
- include an AmeriCorps notice in the weekly bulletin or monthly newsletter.

Educational Institutions

- set-up an AmeriCorps information table in a high traffic area, like a cafeteria or student center.
- connect AmeriCorps recruiting with special campus or community events, such as college or career fairs, orientation activities, and festivals, to reach more students and parents.
- write an article for the school newspaper or include a flyer in direct mailings.
